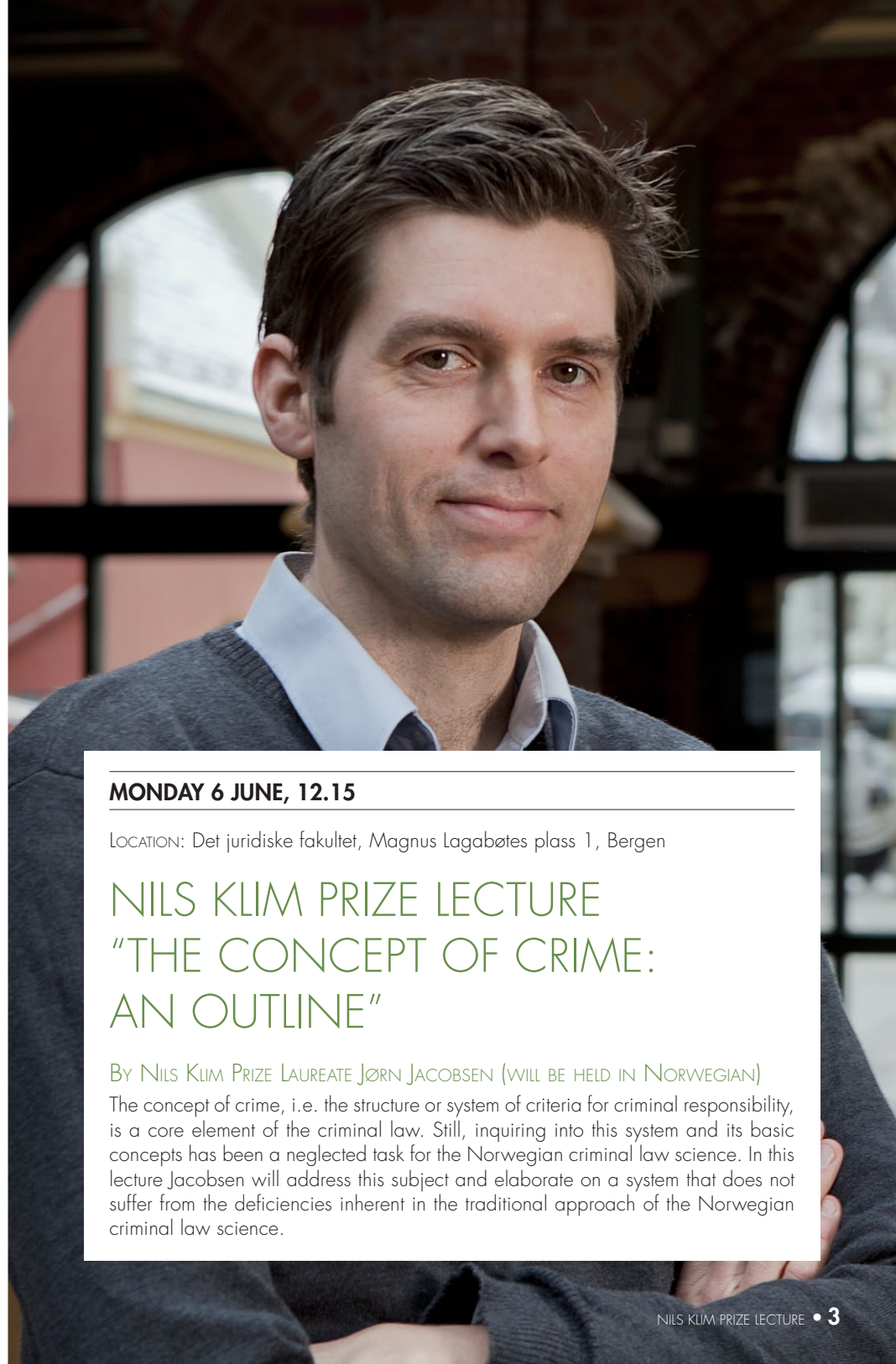
THE HOLBERG INTERNATIONAL MEMORIAL PRIZE is awarded annually for outstanding scholarly work in the fields of the arts and humanities, social sciences, law and theology. The prize is worth NOK 4.5 million. The Laureate of 2011 is Jürgen Kocka, German Professor of History.

THE NILS KLIM PRIZE is awarded to a younger Nordic researcher within the academic fields of the Holberg Prize. The prize is worth NOK 250 000. The Laureate of 2011 is Jørn Jacobsen, postdoctoral researcher at the faculty of law at the University of Bergen.

THE HOLBERG PRIZE SCHOOL PROJECT is a research competition for students in Norwegian upper secondary schools. The Holberg Prize wishes to contribute to greater understanding, interest and enthusiasm for research in the academic fields covered by the prize. Three of the projects are awarded prizes of respectively NOK 15 000, 10 000 and 5 000. A teacher's grant is also awarded.

THE HOLBERG PRIZE was established by the Norwegian Parliament in 2003. It is named after Ludvig Holberg, the famous Norwegian-Danish playwright and scholar. He played an important part in bringing the enlightenment to the Nordic countries. The Nils Klim Prize is named after the hero in Ludvig Holberg's novel *Nils Klim's Subterranean Journey*.

NILS KLIM PRIZE LECTURE "THE CONCEPT OF CRIME: AN OUTLINE"


BY NILS KLIM PRIZE LAUREATE JØRN JACOBSEN (WILL BE HELD IN NORWEGIAN)

The concept of crime, i.e. the structure or system of criteria for criminal responsibility, is a core element of the criminal law. Still, inquiring into this system and its basic concepts has been a neglected task for the Norwegian criminal law science. In this lecture Jacobsen will address this subject and elaborate on a system that does not suffer from the deficiencies inherent in the traditional approach of the Norwegian criminal law science.

CHRISTOPH CONRAD:

"CROWDING OUT OR CO-PRODUCTION ? THE PUBLIC-PRIVATE INTERPLAY IN THE CARE FOR THE ELDERLY"

CHRISTOPH CONRAD received his PhD from the Free University of Berlin and is, since 2002, Professor of contemporary history at the University of Geneva, Switzerland. His research interests include the comparative and transnational history of the welfare state, the development of public opinion and market research as well as the history of national historiographies in Europe. He is currently working on an overview of the relationships between nation building and historical consciousness in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

THEDA SKOCPOL:

"TEA PARTY MOBILIZATIONS AND THE FUTURE OF AMERICA'S GENERATIONALLY UNEVEN WELFARE STATE"

THEDA SKOCPOL is the Victor S. Thomas Professor of Government and Sociology at Harvard University. At Harvard, she has served as Dean of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences and as Director of the Center for American Political Studies. Skocpol's work covers an unusually broad spectrum of topics including both comparative politics and American politics. Skocpol's current research focuses on social policy changes during the Obama presidency; the Tea Party movement in the United States; and the development of higher education in cross-national perspective.

PER SELLE is Professor of Comparative Politics, University of Bergen and Senior Researcher at Norut - Alta. His research interests include voluntary organizations and welfare states, environmental movements, political culture, indigenous politics and democratic theory. He has been jointly in charge of The Norwegian part of the Johns Hopkins Comparative Non-Profit Sector Project (CNP) and was a member of the group leading the Norwegian Power and Democracy Project.

HOLBERG PRIZE LAUREATE JÜRGEN KOCKA:

“CONFLICTS AND CORRESPONDENCE BETWEEN CIVIL SOCIETY AND THE WELFARE STATE SINCE THE 19TH CENTURY. GERMANY IN COMPARATIVE PERSPECTIVE”

JÜRGEN KOCKA is the Holberg Prize Laureate 2011. He is a historian of modern Germany and Europe and he is particularly interested in comparative approaches, social history and cooperation with the social sciences. From 1973 to 2009 he taught history at the University of Bielefeld and the Free University of Berlin. As a Visiting Professor he teaches regularly at the University of California, Los Angeles and he is presently a Permanent Fellow at the International Research Center re:work at the Humboldt University in Berlin.
